Jacqueline Baumgartner

Country Director for Colombia, Office of the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Western Hemisphere Affairs (WHA), U.S. Department of Defense

Jacqueline Baumgartner is the Country Director for Colombia in the Office of the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Western Hemisphere Affairs (WHA) at the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) for Policy. In this position, she oversees defense strategy, policy issues, and bilateral relations related to Colombia.

Before entering government service, Ms. Baumgartner worked for the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) Headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland as well as delegations in Paris, Athens, and Washington, D.C. Her work supported humanitarian assistance projects in conflict, post-conflict, disaster, and migration related settings. Prior to the ICRC, she worked for the American Red Cross and International Rescue Committee on immigration issues. She also served as a National Security Education Program (NSEP) David L. Boren Fellow studying Turkish in Baku, Azerbaijan for six months.

Ms. Baumgartner received a Masters in Public Affairs from Princeton University School of Public and International Affairs and a Bachelor of Arts degree in International Studies from American University's School of International Service in Washington, D.C. Ms. Baumgartner speaks Spanish and French and is learning Turkish.

Director for Aviation and Surface Transportation, United States National Security Council, The White House

Naomi González currently serves as the Director for Aviation and Surface Transportation at the National Security Council (NSC), The White House, where she is responsible for the development and coordination of interagency policy on aviation and surface transportation. She has been appointed by the U.S. President Biden to be a member of the Transportation Security Oversight Board (TSOB) to review any regulation or Security Directives issued by the Administrator

of the TSA. Naomi has nearly two decades of public service to the United States in national security, homeland security and 16 of those years in domestic and international aviation security expertise.

Prior to joining the NSC, Naomi served as the Regional Bureau Chief for the Western Hemisphere Region, International Operations, at the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Transportation Security Administration (TSA). She was responsible for 53 countries and territories across North America, South America, Central America, and the Caribbean. Nearly 70 percent of all U.S. international traffic flies to or from destinations in the region each year with approximately 9,108 flights per week. She also served in positions in the Asia-Pacific Region managing multiple country portfolios including China, India, Japan, Singapore, South Korea, and Thailand as an aviation security subject matter expert providing recommendations, guidance, and advice on complex civil aviation security matters.

Ms. González holds a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration with a minor in Marketing and a Master's degree in Business Administration with a minor in Finance. She graduated from American University's TSA Senior Leadership Studies and completed the United Nations International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) Aviation Security Professional Manager (AVSEC PM) certification at Concordia University, Canada.
